


The Lenten Season is fast approaching, and it is a time for us to slow down and reflect on ourselves and our world as we prepare for the coming of Easter. Lent lasts forty days, not including Sundays, and represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted before starting his ministry. So, we today also take this opportunity to fast, examine, and focus on our relationship to God.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, and this year we will offer a couple options for you to welcome in this holy

season with worship and the imposition of ashes. On Feb. 22, the first way to receive ashes, whether on your head or your hand, will be offering an Ashes on the Go. You can come to the church on Ash Wednesday from 8:30-9:30 am to be marked with a cross on your way to work or to begin your day. You'll be able to drive through the parking lot to receive a blessing and be reminded that "you are dust and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

As is tradition, we will also be having an evening worship service following our usual fellowship meal. Worship will begin at 6 pm, and we will reflect on themes of repentance and human mortality. This will help us to focus us for the Lenten Season on Christ who came into this world to experience life as a human and sacrifice himself for our sins. We hope you'll join us for one or both of these services!



Men's breakfast is coming back February 11th with some new times. We will start at 8 with coffee, juice and fellowship. Breakfast will be ready by 8:30. The menu will be the same with eggs, sausage gravy, bacon and biscuits. A short devotion will follow and a time for a program.

Not Quite Home... from the Senior Pastor

A friend of mine was recently recalling the events of January 2014. She noted that in the first two weeks of that year she had experienced two power outages, an ice storm, and their drinking water had been poisoned by a chemical spill in the area where they lived. As she reflected on this she wrote, "I guess every year has its challenges."

Isn't that the truth?

For the past few years, we have passed through some of our own challenges. There is no reason to name or list them because we know and are still living the aftermath of the main challenge we faced. Many challenges still face the UMC that we love as well.

However, one thing has not changed from 2014 to 2023 or any year before and in between. *God is present.*

Sure, some of you may tire of saying that as we gather for worship on some Sunday morning. You may tire of hearing it and just phase out the other phrases as well - *God is active*. *God is in control*.

One of the fundamental things that we need to learn as Christians, however, is the basic truth contained in those phrases. It is not just the first step we need to make in the Christian life, it is the very foundation of living a Christian life every day.



When we are about to lose it at work with a co-worker because of their actions - God is present.

When we look at the bills piling up on our desk - God is active.

When we look at ourselves in the mirror and don't like what we see - God is in control.

When we are happy that we successfully completed some task - God is present.

When we are thrilled that our children listened to our advice - God is active.

When we look at the sunshine - God is in control.

Learning to live a spiritual life, a life that is flooded with the presence of Jesus Christ is not something that is ever "completed". We learn it repeatedly through every heartache, every success, every trial, and every moment of joy.

I hope and pray that 2023 is filled with more moments of joy for you and for us as a congregation than any year in our past 151 as a community of faith. But no matter what, *God is present. God is active. God is in control.*



- 10 wooden craft sticks

- Markers
- A photo and glue (optional)
- Craft knife (and adult help)
- Ribbon or a rubber band

What you do:

- 1. Set the sticks side by side. Secure with two tape strips.
- 2. Flip the sticks over. Draw (or glue on) a picture or write a message or Bible verse. If using glue, let dry.
- 3. Flip the sticks again and remove tape. If you glued on a photo, have an adult help cut the sticks (and photo) apart.
- 4. Secure the sticks with ribbon or a rubber band.
- 5. Deliver the gift and invite the recipient to assemble the puzzle.
