Not Quite Home...from Pastor Scott

It is quite obvious by the readings from the Third week of Easter in the Revised Common Lectionary that the word about Jesus' Resurrection was spreading fast. The Gospel reading for that day is the story found in Luke 24:13-35 about the journey of Cleopas and an unnamed disciple travelling to Emmaus from Jerusalem following the death of Jesus on the Roman cross and the Jesus. We must look to the Cross as a symbol of what "power" "strange events" reported by women to the other followers.

When we read John's account of the Easter morning, Mary starts out the whole Resurrection story telling by saying, "I have seen the Lord." Possibly due to different reports and influenced greatly by the treatment of women during the day, Luke reports that "several women went to the tomb and found it empty. Stranger still they said they saw a vision of angels that told them that Jesus was not there." It would not be hard to argue that John's gospel actually cleaned up the "washed" version of Luke since it was most likely written later, but we will never know things like that. We can only learn from the differences that dif- might be accidentally putting up to people hearing and seeing ferences existed in the days of their writing.

What Luke really lets us know is that the word is spreading fast, even though it is being received with a lot of skepticism. Some think this skepticism - "they were prevented from recognizing Jesus" - was the result of some supernatural influence on the disciples. Others, like me, think that the disappointment the disciples were feeling over their lost dreams and their lost hopes prevented them from seeing the resurrected Jesus. They had placed their hopes in the political revival of Israel and the fulfillment of Israel's mission to be a "light to all nations."

In our world today it is so easy to place our hopes on political solutions to the seeming problems that we face. Democrats and Republicans alike want to take the message found in the Bible and make it fit their policies or aims. Christians have allowed this type of Christian Nationalism to take place without much push

back, because, well, it makes at least some of us seem to be on the side of power.

But having our hopes in anything other than the works and deeds that point to a prophet of God in Jesus, will have us looking the wrong way and Jesus could just as easily walk up to us today and we would not recognize him. We must place all our hopes in can do to those who wish to upend the status quo and we must see the Resurrection as the power of God breaking forth in the world in new ways, at all times, to bring about days when that Kingdom of Jesus will be formed.

We must do this because Jesus has done something so incredibly different on the Cross and with the Resurrection

(One other difference I would note is that Jesus went out into the street and joined these unbelieving disciples on both their journey and their conversation. Think about what obstacles we Jesus in their midst?)

Years ago, when I was in a production of Godspell, I had a line from the philosopher Buckminster Fuller. I was 15 and had no idea who he was, so I did some study on him. Great inventor. Better motivator. Recently I ran into another quote from Fuller that perfectly describes what Jesus started with the Resurrection. I hope that as you read these words in light of what Jesus' hopes are for the Kingdom that they words will speak the Good News in a new way for you:

"You never change things by fighting the existing reality. To change something, build a new model that makes the existing model obsolete." **Buckminster Fuller**


