# **Not Quite Home**

"As Jesus walked alongside the Galilee Sea, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew, throwing fishing nets into the sea, because they were fishermen. "Come, follow me," he said, "and I'll show you how to fish for people." Right away, they left their nets and followed him." Matthew 4:19-20

In some ways, I am always amazed at the way the call of Jesus is answered by the disciples in the Gospel accounts. There is no debate. There is no discernment. There is no talking it over with family. There is no checking the calendar. There is no figuring out what is most important.

Jesus calls the disciples to follow, and they drop everything and follow.

Some people read these stories and think that they are totally unrealistic. There is no way that people just left their jobs and family to follow Jesus. There is no way that they changed priorities that quickly and in fact, it is not a good way to live your life now. It may have worked then, but that was such a different time, it could never work today.

Others read these stories and think that Jesus had to be exuding some powerful charisma to get these people to leave everything and follow him. And these folks translate this story today into being a story that they hear and say, "Sure, if the right person comes along and has that kind of charisma, power, and compelling need, I will follow in a heartbeat." (The problem with charisma, power, and compelling needs, however, is that they are always based on OUR perspective, so we can easily decide what to focus on or not.)

Yet others read these stories and think, "You know, perhaps the fisherman had heard about this teacher from Galilee. Perhaps they had even met him on some other occasion. They knew what he was about. They knew that he was a faithful follower of God, so that made it simple for them to do what he asked."

Jesus is still calling people to follow him today. First and foremost, Jesus wants people to become disciples by giving their

lives and heart to Jesus and Jesus' Kingdom. Many people have done this. Most people involved in the life of the church have made this decision at some point.

However, the call does not stop there. To really live out the life of a disciple of Jesus, we must constantly listen for *the next thing* Jesus wants us to do. Perhaps we will hear this second call (or third or fourth or whatever number) as we listen to the needs of the Kingdom being lived out in the church. The call to teach. The call to serve. The call to preach. The call to lead. The call to simply give more – of our time, our talents, and our resources – to the work of the Kingdom.

How are you responding to "call" you are hearing these days from Jesus or Jesus' Kingdom? Are you waiting on someone with the right charisma or the need that speaks to your agenda? Are you finding ways to look at your time and saying to yourself, "I've nothing left to give to the One who gave his life for me."? Or are you thinking about all that Jesus has done for you and just finding some way to say "Yes" when Jesus calls.

Listen, I know how difficult this can be. I spent several years avoiding the real call Jesus placed upon me to become a pastor. However, nothing brings me more peace than living my life in the way that I know God has called me to live it.

Listen. Listen to God calling you today or sometime in the future.

And drop everything...and follow. You will never regret it.

# **United Methodism and the** "Disaffiliation Movement"

Many of you may have read or heard about churches within the United Methodist denomination disaffiliating from the denomination. Some of this news has included the improper language that these churches chose to become member churches of a new, more conservative, Methodist denomination known as the Global Methodist Church. There are no provisions in the Discipline to allow to transfer a church to The Global Methodist Church.

In 2019, the special session General Conference added a paragraph to the *Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church* that says in part: "Because of the current deep conflict within the United Methodist Church around issues of human sexuality, a local church shall have a limited right, under the provisions of this paragraph, to disaffiliate..." This paragraph, 2553, goes on to say that Annual Conference Boards of Trustees set up the plan for churches to disaffiliate and that these plans then are approved by the annual conference. Our Board of Trustees drafted the plan for disaffiliation within the WVAC and it was approved by the Annual Conference in 2019. To date, NO churches within the WVAC have held a vote to disaffiliate under this paragraph, although many have chosen to close – a different paragraph of the Discipline covers closures. (This year Annual Conference will vote on the closure of approximately 55 churches in WV, half of which are closing for financial reasons, the other half of which are closing for theological differences.) It is not possible under paragraph 2553 to become a Global Methodist Church. This paragraph only allows the church to pay a predetermined amount of money for the Conference owned property along with payments to cover unfunded pension debts and become a disaffiliated church.

Any church that chooses to disaffiliate must complete the process by December 31 of this year. Below is a chart from The United Methodist News Service showing the number of disaffiliations since the passage of this paragraph in 2019. The grand total represents about 13% of the total number of UM Churches in the United States. (Please note that this information is dated May 25, 2023)
