Not Quite Home ...

from Pastor Scott

Easter comes early this year. It could come earlier, but this year it is still coming early. It arrives before the start of April. It could arrive as early as March 22, but still, March 31st seems pretty early. If you are not careful, it might even catch you off guard.

Well, the truth of the matter is that it almost always catches us off guard to some degree. We are talking about the Resurrection. We are talking about celebrating Jesus' victory over sin and death. That tends to catch us up short no matter how much we are looking for it.

This year throughout the season of Lent we are looking at the life of Peter. In one of the first stories about this disciple, Jesus talks him into casting his fishing nets in the middle of the day and Peter catches more fish than he could handle. Peter's response is to eventually leave everything and follow Jesus.

In John 21, a post Resurrection story, Peter is again out in his boat fishing. (Yeah, I thought he left everything too, so I guess he went and bought a new boat.) But he's still out there in the lake fishing when some stranger on the shore says something about casting their nets on the other side of the boat. When they do, they catch a huge haul of fish again. Someone in the boat makes the proclamation that the stranger must be Jesus. Peter jumps in the water and swims to shore. Well, actually, the text says that Peter put on his clothes, jumped in the lake, and swam to shore.

I think the appearance of Jesus caught him a little off guard, too.

It is amazing to me that in both stories, the story where Peter becomes a disciple, and the story where Jesus comes to the disciple after the Resurrection, Peter is the recipient of a "grace-filled" catch of fish. Even if he is caught short by the

appearance of Jesus, Jesus is ready to pour out his grace upon this disciple.

Easter comes early this year. The reality is that "Easter" can come at any moment. Jesus' victory over sin and death means that he might decide to appear in our lives at any moment. We may think we are getting ready for a particular date to celebrate the Resurrection, but that is such a world changing event, we may never truly be ready.

All I can tell you as your pastor is this:

Easter is coming. Jesus is ready to meet you right where you are. And Jesus is ready to pour out God's grace upon you. Don't worry about being ready to go meet Jesus at Easter. Just go. Jesus is ready to meet you right now.

Maundy Thursday (Holy Thursday) Service



To many families across the West Virginia mountains, winter is a hectic, desperate time. They are struggling to have enough heat, water, and adequate supplies to face the cold. Even if both parents are working, they cannot always deal with frozen pipes, illness, or an unexpected skid on the ice. Most of what people need to survive winter is not cheap. That is where we come in by supporting all of our West Virginia Conference Mission. They help families that we will never meet, up the hollows and down the street.

COME—The Celebration of Mission Event is an ingathering of money and goods for ALL West Virginia Mission Projects sponsored by the United Methodist Conference:



All of these missions are fighting the cold with food, clothing, heating vouchers, and home repairs. But, they don't stop there. Each is unique in the services they provide for their communities. Each is the same in the message of God's love they extend to those communities. They try to provide what their community needs. But, they cannot do their work if we do not do ours. The churches of the West Virginia Conference must provide the work funds, stock the shelves, and volunteer the muscle.

What are their stories? Each is different but all are involved in providing families with basic needs—food, clothing, utility, and rent expenses. That help can take many forms from thrift stores, to backpack food for school children, Christmas baskets, layettes, community lunches, community gardens, childcare and after-school mentoring, art classes, Bible schools, and work teams. No matter the activities, each Mission Project represents all of us, serving as God's hands in West Virginia.

In 2023, total Conference giving to the Celebration of Mission Event was \$90,271.35—down about 10%. In 9 Rivers our giving did not double as it should, but fell to a little over \$9000 plus goods. As usual First Church was the leader in giving with \$3200 plus donated goods.

In 2024, 9 Rivers will be emphasizing Ebenezer Outreach, House of the Carpenter, and Volunteers in Mission. We don't yet have details for an ingathering, but it is not too early to begin raising funds and collecting goods. Below are the mission needs lists:


