

Not Quite Home ...

From Pastor Scott

One of the most poignant scenes among the accounts of the crucifixion of Jesus is found in John 19:

²⁶ When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." ²⁷ Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

In this scene, we have a disciple watching his Lord give up his very life for the Kingdom. As a response to that, this disciple is more than willing to give of himself to take his Lord's mother into his own care.

I see this as a story of Jesus creating – even while dying upon the cross – a community that thrives when it gives. Jesus creates disciples who are made for giving just as their Lord gave his life.

In the 21 days leading up to November 10, you are invited to participate in devotionals prepared to bring us to a place of thinking about our giving in a prayerful state. Printed books are available in the sanctuary and videos of the devotion will be posted daily on our Facebook page.

Last week and over the next few weeks we will hear testimonies from people who have been touched by the giving nature of the disciples of First Church. I hope these stories and testimonies move you as much as "the beloved disciple" was moved.

On November 10, 2024, First Church will be receiving Estimate of Giving Cards from their members and friends to help us plan the Kingdom work we will do through the next year. A copy of that card is enclosed. You can bring this card with you, filled out or ready to be filled out as part of the worship service that day. (Additional copies will be available.)

As part of this special day we will also be celebrating with a Fellowship Meal following worship. This is a catered meal offered to you at no cost. Recovery Point Thanksgiving

Recovery Point West Virginia provides a long-term, residential recovery program based on the social model of recovery. We offer drop-in recovery coaching services and transitional recovery residences through The Point Cafe, as well as The Point Apartments. Recovery Point WV programs follow the 12-Step model of Alcoholics Anonymous to help clients find lasting recovery. We also offer board-recognized Peer Recovery credential training at no cost to those with a desire to become certified. Recovery Point WV works to promote hope and recovery across the state.

This year, First UMC is celebrating that we can reach out to those in our community who are going through the process of recovery with the love of Christ by providing a Thanksgiving meal on Wednesday, November 27.

Plans for the church's 10th annual Thanksgiving dinner for residents of Recovery Point, an addiction recovery program are under way and your help is needed.

We will host about 150 residents, and perhaps some of their family members, for a traditional meal at 1 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 27.

The menu will include turkey and ham, plus all the usual trimmings.

There are several ways you can help. Donations to purchase food may be made directly to the church. Please note the gift is for the Thanksgiving dinner. We will cook Monday and Tuesday from 9-4 and Wednesday until service time. If you would prefer to prepare a dish at home for the dinner, those are welcome, too.

It is a wonderful experience and so rewarding to serve others. We have only to watch the evening news to visualize that first Christmas. In Appalachia, Hawaii, and in a hundred other disaster areas, we see poor families far from home, seeking shelter in a foreign town. When we watch a determined father floating his family to safety through Florida flood waters, we can imagine Joseph leading that little donkey through the night. When we hear about a frightened young mother giving birth in the teeth of the storm or under a bush, we can better understand how Mary survived in that humble stable. The Holy Family was forced to wander searching for safe shelter, just as families around the world are trying to survive in school gyms, refugee camps, and strange new surroundings. Jesus grew up in Nazareth beloved by his parents. He was trained in religion and a trade. Too many children lack these basic needs-a loving family, food, shelter, and education. Too many adults are struggling to escape substance abuse or other misfortunes. This Christmas look into the faces of those in need and give as Jesus has taught us to give.
