#### Super Sunday

May God be with you and all of us on this Super Journey!!


## A sh Wednesday

March 5, 2025

We will be celebrating Ash Wednesday with two opportunities to receive the imposition of ashes. (These are ashes applied to the forehead of Christ followers to remind ourselves that ultimately, we all live and die by the grace of God.)

On the morning of Ash Wednesday, March 5th, Pastor Scott will be at the entrance to the Westside Parking Lot of First UMC for anyone who would like to drive through and receive their ashes. He will be there from 6:30 am to 8:30 am.

At 6:00 pm that evening, we will gather for an Ash Wednesday Worship Service. The theme of the service is "everything [in] between — intention & action" and is part of the larger Lenten series that you can read about elsewhere in this newsletter.



# "Everything [in] between" - Our series for L ent 2025

This series, inspired by the Narrative Lectionary (Year 3)\*, allows the Gospel of Luke to guide us through Lent. Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), the series flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. Many of these stories are well-known in both sacred and secular imagination, carrying cultural relevance and lore. For example, have you ever identified yourself as either a "Mary" or a "Martha?" The "Good Samaritan" title alone could reference a hospital, a charitable organization, a type of law, or a good deed. Perhaps you grew up singing "Zacchaeus was a wee little man" in Sunday School. So many of these scriptures hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between.

As the designers studied these scriptures, they were struck by how Jesus' ministry was rooted in relationships that disrupted the established social, political, and religious divides of his time. As modern readers, we sometimes lose the "shock factor" behind Jesus' words, as his teaching tactics likely felt extreme for those in his context. He described a stigmatized Samaritan as a good neighbor. He emphasized the value of 1 sheep in a herd of 100. He dined with a tax collector who amassed wealth through extortion. While dying on the cross, he told a convicted criminal he would soon find paradise. Jesus intentionally highlighted the cultural and political polarities of his time to emphasize the radical, inclusive, and surprising love of God. When we study these stories in their historical and cultural context, we see how they mirror the cultural and political divides many of us experience in our families, churches, and communities today.

This series is an invitation to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. Each weekly sub-theme explores two supposed opposites, like "faith & works" or "rest & growth," or "grief & hope." We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between.

And so, this season, you are invited to look beyond black and white "opposites" and easy answers. We encourage you to notice the dichotomies that define our lives, but also imagine where God might be meeting us beyond the categories we create. This theme may resonate with anyone who is in discernment or trying to find their way through an undefined space. It will speak to anyone who feels as if they are living in a divided world. It is for those who seek a spiritual life that engages with complexity instead of avoiding it. This Lent, we're trusting that God shows up in shades of gray, rainbow hues, and everywhere in between.

"So much of the beauty of the world comes from the in-between spaces. In the space between night and day, the sun and atmosphere collide into a dazzling display of color. Waterfalls span the space between cliffs and the river below with astonishing power. Mangrove forests, beaches, and bayous exist entirely in the space between land and water. The edges of things, the mixing spaces, the spaces where biomes collide, are the most interesting places on earth. And yet, we feel the compulsion to exist in categories. We construct boxes around 'sacred' and 'secular,' 'woman' and 'man,' 'left' and 'right,' compressing the complexity and beauty of the whole spectrum of being into just two words. What a gift it is to set the boxes aside and follow the example of our Creator who created night and day and everything in between; land and water and everything in between; you and me and everything in between. The Alpha and the Omega is surely with us in the space in between."

#### Church F inances for 2025

I am pleased to share with you that at the end of 2024, we were able to send an additional \$20,000.00 to the Conference for our apportionments, which made the total for 2024 to be \$34,094 (31%).

Our total pledges for 2025 ended up being \$306,990 which represents 59 giving units. The pledges represent 60% of our 2025 Budget.

Again, the Finance Committee wants to thank each person that made a commitment to help offset the budget for this current year.

I heard an expert say recently, that the country has lost compassion. That may well be true for a large part of the population, but for our church family compassion is alive and well. How do I know this.? Because of how generously you give to Missions near and far. This has been a rough few years for our church, but still you give. In 2024,

- We supported the Celebration of Mission Event with a donation of \$2300 and \$270 in donated goods to WV Mission Projects
- -Thanks also to the Mission Grant, we maintain the porta-pot; donated \$1500 to Cridlin for food; \$400 to Branches; \$1200 to the City Mission Lunch program; \$2000 to the Ebenezer building fund; and \$400 to Harmony House
- In the Spring, we collected undies and socks for Cridlin and Ebenezer (They can always use more).
- -Then there were the 10,250 food bags we filled for Rise Against Hunger-a great day for Missions and intergenerational fellowship.
- We have responded to disasters with an outpouring of donations to UMCOR.
- Each month we collect food and clothing for Cridlin and then help distribute it.
- -The youth went to Ronald McDonald House to bake cookies
- At Christmas, our 23 Ebenezer Angels got their presents and their Christmas cookies.
- -The magic Mitten Tree was filled to overflowing twice. Those items have gone to Cridlin, Ebenezer, Branches, and Asheville, NC Helene victims with a little bit of help from Brooks-Howell Home in Asheville.
